Dr. Howard Ovens



Dr. Howard Ovens is an emergency physician and Chief Medical Strategy Officer of Sinai Health. At the University of Toronto he holds the rank of Full Professor at the Dept. of Family and Community Medicine and is a Senior Fellow in the Institute of Health Policy, Management and Evaluation. He is the Ontario Expert Lead for Emergency Medicine; in that capacity he chairs the Emergency Services Advisory Committee. He is also a member of the Public Affairs Committee of the Canadian Association of Emergency Physicians; he tweets about issues in the administration of and public policy related to emergency services using the handle @HowardOvens and his blog "Waiting to be seen" is hosted on the Emergency Medicine Cases website.

Dr. Leigh Chapman



Dr. Leigh Chapman's nursing career includes a variety of direct service and clinical leadership positions, most recently as Director of Clinical Services with Inner City Health Associates in Toronto where she helped develop, launch and oversee the nursing component of this program of care for people experiencing homelessness. She has cultivated a culture of nursing practice across RNs, RPNs and LPNs, NPs and MDs grounded in health equity that is trauma informed, low barrier, anti-oppressive and harm reduction focused. She has an MSc from McMaster and a PhD from University of Toronto and most recently was named the Chief Nursing Officer of Canada.

Dr. Aleks Chochinov



Dr. Chochinov is Professor of Emergency Medicine at the University of Manitoba and an emergency physician at St Boniface Hospital in Winnipeg. Until 2020, he was university department head and Specialty Lead for EM in MB. His research/policy interests are in hypothermia, drowning, ED operations and health systems. He also maintains an active interest in health HR planning, as former Chair of the CMA Council on Education and Workforce. Dr. Chochinov is currently Chair of CAEP's EM:POWER task force on the future of emergency care. He intends to retire just as soon as he saves the Canadian healthcare system.

Dr. David Petrie



Dr. David A Petrie is an emergency physician at the QE2 Health Science Centre in Halifax/professor of Emergency Medicine with Dalhousie University. He has been Medical Director of the Halifax Regional ground EMS system, the Provincial LifeFlight/critical care transport program, the Academic Head/Clinical District Chief of the Department of Emergency Medicine Dalhousie/Central Zone, and most recently, the senior medical director of the provincial Emergency Program of Care/Nova Scotia Health Authority. His academic interests have ranged from prehospital and trauma systems research, to studying the impact of critical thinking and complexity science on leadership decision-making and health system redesign.

Dr. Heather Patterson



Dr. Heather Patterson is an adult and pediatric emergency physician and photographer from Calgary, Alberta, Canada. When the pandemic struck, Dr. Patterson decided to put her twenty years of photography experience to use and began photographing the intimate moments at Calgary hospitals that went on to become *Shadows and Light*, her recent book publication. Photographs from the project have been featured in *Macleans*, where they were a finalist for a National Magazine Award, and the *Calgary Herald* and on CBC, *CityNews*, *Global News*, and *CTV*. Patterson has received the Award for Medical Journalism from the Canadian Association of Emergency Physicians and her work has been featured in medical journals and presented at conferences and grand rounds across Canada.

Judy Linton



Judy Linton is a seasoned nursing executive who works in partnership with Dr. Chris Simpson, Ontario Health's Executive Vice-President, Medical to advance evidence-based clinical excellence, help set standards that drive consistency, and enable the delivery of quality care and positive health outcomes. That experience radically changed Jen's understanding of the possibilities of healthcare and she strives to facilitate that kind of possibility in all of her work.

Dr. Shelley McLeod



Dr. Shelley McLeod is a Clinical Epidemiologist and the Research Director of the Schwartz/Reisman Emergency Medicine Institute (SREMI) at Sinai Health, and an Associate Professor in the Department of Family and Community Medicine and the Institute of Health Policy, Management and Evaluation at the University of Toronto. She has over 19 years of experience working in emergency medicine research with expertise in clinical research methodology and biostatistics and has published more than 110 papers in a varied array of emergency medicine topics. Her main academic interests include emergency department triage and flow, evidence synthesis including network meta-analysis, trial design, and program evaluation. Dr. McLeod is currently leading the provincial evaluation of the virtual urgent care pilot program in Ontario.
